This site was planned as a repository for historic structures and landmarks, to be situated in a mark-like setting which would reflect the rural/village aspects of living in pre-Civil War Long Island. It is a hybrid of municipal museum/restoration village, with some public participation of an active nature, as well as some permanent museum type activities.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANCE:

In 1974, faced with the destruction or demolition of buildings in Islip Town which were of historic value, and offered the purchase of 12 acres of land contiguous with the 35 acre Broadway Avenue Town Park, the Town of Islip directed the Town Planning Department to formulate a plan for the preservation of buildings on the site. Site clearing and demolition of buildings of historic value has always been a problem, but a commitment to preserve and relocate these structures had never existed in the Town of Islip until 1974.





### WINDMILL RESTORATION

The Town of Islip in its important Bicentennial restoration program has tackled a most exciting project: the re-commissioning of a turn-of-thecentury windmill. (right above.) Once used to pump water for a large estate, and recently in danger of demolition, the windmill has been moved to the Town's preservation area and is being refurbished. The windmill vanes will have a diameter of ten feet when the new blades arrive from the manufacturer in Ohio. This restoration recalls that carried out in Fairfield, Connecticut, where concerned citizens enlisted the Town's support in the preservation and revitalization of the Bronson windmill at Greenfield Hill.


DUTCH REFORMED CHURCH





OCKERS BARNS




#### CARRIAGE SHED
